


Walking in Faith: A Pilgrimage to the Tuthu Shrines

"Blessed are those whose strength is in You, whose hearts are set on pilgrimage." - Psalm 84:5

n the quiet hours of Saturday, August 30th, long before the first light of dawn, the Consolata Shrine in Westlands, Nairobi stirred with sacred anticipation. By 4:00 a.m., pilgrims - rosaries in hand and hearts aflame with devotion - began to gather for a profound spiritual journey to the Tuthu Catholic Shrines in Murang'a County.

What awaited was not simply a retreat from the city, but a pilgrimage of faith, memory, and mission - a return to the roots of Catholic evangelization in Central Kenya, and a reflection on the enduring legacy of Blessed Joseph Allamano, the visionary founder of the Consolata Missionaries.

Returning to Sacred Ground

While the first Mass at Tuthu was celebrated on June 29, 1902, the pilgrimage this year was scheduled for August 30th - a date chosen in February this year at the same venue by leaders who had assembled to mark the start of the centennial celebrations in commemorating the death of Blessed Allamano, who passed away in 1926.



Tucked in the serene, tea-covered verdant hills of Kiharu Constituency, the Tuthu Shrines occupy hallowed ground. This was the first mission station in Central Kenya established by the Consolata Missionaries. It was here, under a Mugumo tree - once sacred to the Kikuyu people - that the missionaries celebrated their first Mass, introducing the Gospel through presence, compassion and cultural understanding. The tree that once symbolized indigenous worship became a shelter for a new encounter with the Divine.

» For the pilgrims from the Consolata Shrine, a spectacularly large in number in recent times with over five hundred confirmed attendants in fourteen buses, it was not just a historical visit - it was a return to spiritual ancestry, a reconnection with the lives, sacrifices and triumphs of those who brought the light of Christ to Kenyan soil.

Moments of Prayer, History and Encounter

The journey unfolded in a deeply spiritual rhythm: rosary prayers, hymns to Our Lady, silent reflection and a profound sense of unity among the faithful marked the hours on the road. A brief stop in Murang'a offered refreshment before the final stretch began.

Upon arrival, the pilgrims disembarked near a local Catholic church and proceeded to a three-kilometre walk to the sacred grounds. The first stop was a solemn visit to the site where Aloyse Kamau, the first catechist and teacher under the early missionaries, was martyred for his faith. His memory remains a powerful symbol of Kenya's early Christian witness.

Awaiting them at the site were the faithful of the local community - welcoming, warm and proud stewards of the shrine's history. Among them was Jackson 'Copper', a spirited natural storyteller whose humour and knowledge brought the early missionary journey to life. His vivid narrations deepened the pilgrims' understanding of Tuthu's significance - not only as a geographical destination, but as a spiritual landmark.

The Legacy of Faith and Transformation

One of the most striking stories retold was that of Paramount Chief Joseph Karuri wa Gakure, the local leader who welcomed the missionaries in 1902. A man of great influence, Chief Karuri not only gave the Consolata Fathers land to establish their mission but eventually converted to Christianity. He adopted the baptismal name "Joseph" and, in obedience to Church teaching, chose to remain with one wife - having previously been married to seventy-two.



His life stands as a testament to radical transformation, the power of the Gospel to reshape lives and the humility to embrace truth, no matter the cost. His legacy endures both in faith and in history etched into the story of the Church in Kenya.

A Pilgrimage of Grace

As pilgrims descended on the steep, meandering village paths flanked by emerald tea fields and birdsong, they meditated on the Stations of the Cross, lifting prayers of healing, gratitude and intercession. At Tuthu Catholic Parish, they walked through the Holy Door of the Jubilee Year, symbolizing new beginnings and the embrace of God's mercy. Many took the opportunity for Sacramental Confession, renewing their spiritual strength and commitment.

All are invited to take part, to walk in the footsteps of saints and missionaries, and to discover anew what it means to be Catholic, Consolata and missionary.

Final Reflection

In the words of Pope Francis:

"Life itself is a pilgrimage, and the human being is a viator - a pilgrim traveling along the road."

As we walked in the hills of Murang'a, we walked also in the heart of our faith. Tuthu reminds us that our story is still being written. And as we walk in faith, may we too become messengers of hope, love, and consolation - missionaries in our time. Œ





Aloys Kamau – Catechist, **Martyr and Servant of God**

A Pilgrimage of Memory, Mission and Holiness

"The blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church." - Tertullian "He who loses his life for my sake will find it." - Matthew 10:39

s Kenya's Catholic Church marks the centenary of the Consolata Missionaries' arrival in Tuthu this year, the faithful are invited to reflect not only on the missionary roots of the Church but also on the lives of local heroes raised by that mission. Among them shines the remarkable witness of Aloys Kamau, a lay catechist whose life, faith, and martyrdom are now under review by the Church in the formal process of canonization.

Kamau's story is told in *Aloys Kamau: Teacher and Martyr*, a biography by Fr. Giuseppe Mina, published by Paulines Publications Africa. Kamau, though not ordained, lived a vocation just as powerful - teaching, evangelizing and ultimately offering his life for Christ.

A Legacy Rooted in Tuthu

Tuthu, often called the cradle of Kenya's Catholic faith, was where the Consolata Missionaries first settled in the early 1900s. These early missionaries, led by Bishop Filippo Perlo, brought the Gospel, opened schools, and began translating catechisms for the local people. From this early foundation, the seeds of the Kenvan Church took root - and Kamau was one of the fruits.

Formed in Tuthu, Kamau was not merely educated in the faith but deeply transformed by it. His commitment as a catechist came not from a title, but from a lived relationship with Christ. He traveled tirelessly across villages, teaching catechism, preparing couples for marriage, guiding catechumens, and serving as a spiritual companion to many. In an era when priests were few and distant. Kamau became the face of the Church in remote communities.

A Lay Missionary, A Local Saint

Unlike many saints of old whose stories begin in distant lands, Kamau's story is firmly African. He was a son of the soil - raised in a Christian home, trained in catechism, and deeply engaged in the cultural life of his community. His evangelization was rooted in the local language, customs, and rhythms of rural life. In him, faith and culture embraced, not clashed.

Kamau embodied what the Church now calls "missionary discipleship." He preached the Gospel not just with words but with his life. His witness was quiet, humble, consistent and for that reason, profoundly effective. Adults admired his character; children were drawn to his warmth. He lived among the people and shared in their joys and struggles, making the Church present even when the priest was not.

Martyrdom in Kenya's Struggle

As Kenya moved into the 1950s and the Mau Mau uprising intensified, tensions between colonial authorities, local communities and religious institutions grew. Christianity, especially through its association with education and missionary influence, was sometimes viewed with suspicion. Kamau, though politically neutral, was not spared from this suspicion.

On April 4, 1953, while journeying to visit catechumens, Kamau was ambushed and killed at just 24 years old. His death was not random. According to eyewitnesses and Church accounts, he was targeted *in odium fidei* - in hatred of the faith. His martyrdom crowned a life already offered in daily service and sacrifice. Though not widely known at the time, his death deeply affected the communities he served. To them, Kamau was already a saint.

A Pilgrimage of Faith and Renewal

year's national pilgrimage to Tuthu, marking 123 years since the arrival of the Consolata Missionaries, is more than a historical celebration. It is a spiritual journey back to the roots of Kenvan Catholicism - and an opportunity to honour one of its most faithful sons.

Pilgrims will walk where Kamau walked, pray where he prayed, and renew their commitment to evangelization in his spirit. The pilgrimage invites a threefold reflection:

- 1. Gratitude for the early missionaries:
- 2. Recognition of local saints like Kamau;
- 3. Recommitment to lay mission, especially the vocation of catechists.

Modern Martyrdom

While few today are called to physical martyrdom, many face ridicule, persecution, or loss for living the faith. Kamau gives courage to those quietly suffering for the Gospel.

• Faith Incarnate in Culture

Kamau evangelized as a Kikuyu, in Kikuyu. His witness affirms that faith need not erase culture but transform it from within.

A Saint in the Making

The Diocese of Murang'a has formally opened the cause for Kamau's canonization. He is now recognized as a Servant of God, the first step toward sainthood. If the Church affirms that his death was indeed martyrdom, no miracle will be needed for beatification—only papal approval.

Across East Africa, his memory already lives on. His grave in Tuthu has become a pilgrimage site. Catechists invoke his name for courage and guidance. His feast is quietly celebrated in communities that still feel his spiritual presence.

In 2021, Pope Francis officially instituted the Lay Ministry of Catechist, giving canonical recognition to what Kamau lived decades earlier. The Pope's apostolic letter Antiquum Ministerium describes catechists as "witnesses of faith, teachers and mystagogues, companions and pedagogues"—a description Kamau fulfilled perfectly.

Saints for Our Time: The **Canonisation of Carlo Acutis** and Pier Giorgio Frassati

n 7th September 2025, a joyful wave swept across the universal Church as Pope Leo XIV proclaimed Carlo Acutis (1991 - 2006) and Pier Giorgio Frassati (1901 - 1925) as saints during a solemn Mass at St. Peter's Square. Their canonisation was not only a moment of great joy for Catholics worldwide but also a profound reminder that sanctity is possible in every generation, especially in the lives of the young.

Two Lives, One Call to Holiness



Carlo Acutis, the youthful saint of our time, lived a life of simplicity, Eucharistic devotion and missionary zeal in the digital world. Proclaimed Patron of the Internet, his example continues to guide young people to holiness by showing that sanctity is possible in everyday life, even in the modern technological age. St Carlo Acutis is the Patron of the Kabete Deanery Teenagers - MYM

Carlo Acutis, a 15-year-old teenager from Milan, is remembered for his deep devotion to the Eucharist and his pioneering spirit in evangelisation through technology. Nicknamed "God's influencer," Carlo used his computer skills to design a website cataloguing Eucharistic miracles, leaving behind a powerful testimony that faith can flourish even in the digital age. His life was tragically cut short when he succumbed to leukemia in 2006, but his radiant love for Christ continues to inspire countless young people today.

Pier Giorgio Frassati, an energetic Italian student and mountaineer who lived decades earlier, embodied what Pope St. John Paul II once called "the man of the Beatitudes." He balanced his studies and love for the outdoors with an unwavering commitment to serving the poor, the sick, and the marginalized. A member of Catholic Action and various lay movements, Pier Giorgio's joyful witness made holiness

attractive. He died of polio at the age of 24, but his legacy of faith-filled service endures.

Though separated by nearly a century, both saints reveal the same truth: holiness is not about age or era, but about a heart set on Christ.

Miracles that Marked Their Path to Sainthood

The Church recognises saints only after careful discernment, and miracles are key signs of their heavenly intercession.

- Carlo Acutis was beatified in 2020 after the miraculous healing of a young Brazilian boy suffering from a rare congenital pancreatic disorder. After his family prayed for Carlo's intercession, the boy was cured instantly and completely, baffling doctors. For his canonisation, the Vatican confirmed a second miracle: the healing of a young woman in Florence who suffered from a severe brain aneurysm. She recovered suddenly after prayers were offered through Carlo's intercession.
- Pier Giorgio Frassati had long been venerated as "the Man of the Beatitudes," and his path to sainthood advanced »

significantly when the Vatican recognized the miraculous healing of a young woman in Argentina who was suffering from multiple organ failure. After prayers invoking Pier

Giorgio's help, her condition reversed dramatically, leading to full recovery. This miracle paved the way for his canonisation alongside Carlo.

These miracles are not simply extraordinary medical recoveries - they are signs of God's mercy working through the intercession of these young saints, affirming the faith of the Church in their holiness.

A Universal Message for Youth

The canonisation of Carlo and Pier Giorgio sends a clear message to today's young Catholics: holiness is possible here and now. Their lives show that following Jesus is not about abandoning joy, hobbies, or modern life, but about integrating faith into daily choices - whether through coding websites, climbing mountains, caring for the poor, or attending daily Mass.

Speaking after the canonisation, Pope Leo XIV reflected: "Carlo and Pier Giorgio remind us that youth is not an obstacle to sanctity but a gift. Their example calls our young people to see their studies, their friendships, their service, and even their use of technology as ways of glorifying God."

In our own parish, this message resonates strongly. Many young people are searching for role models who live authentically, balancing faith with the challenges of modern life. Saints Carlo and Pier Giorgio offer exactly that: witnesses of hope, courage, and joy.

Lessons for Our Parish Community

The canonisation also challenges us as a parish to reflect on how we can better nurture the gifts of our young people. Like Carlo, we are invited to use technology responsibly and creatively for evangelisation. Could our youth groups, for instance, build digital platforms to share parish events, testimonies, or catechetical resources?

Like Pier Giorgio, we are called to deepen our outreach to the poor and marginalized. His example urges us to ensure that parish life always extends beyond the walls of the church, reaching those in need with concrete acts of love.

For parents, the new saints remind us of the vital role of family in nurturing holiness. Carlo's mother has often testified that her son's devotion to the Eucharist transformed her own faith journey. Similarly, Pier Giorgio's commitment to service flowed from the values instilled in him at home. Families in our parish are thus encouraged to cultivate an environment where faith is lived daily, not only on Sundays.

Reflections from the Faithful

At Consolata Shrine, several youths shared their excitement at the canonisation. "Carlo inspires me because he was so normal - he loved games, computers, and sports - but he also loved Jesus deeply," said one member of the Youth Serving Christ (YSC). Another added, "Pier Giorgio shows us that being Catholic is not boring. It's about joy, adventure, and service."

For our clergy, the canonisation is a pastoral moment. Deacon Vincent reflected, "Our youth need witnesses they can relate to. Carlo and Pier Giorgio are saints who wore sneakers, carried backpacks, and still carried their crosses with faith. They show us that the Gospel is alive today."

A Call to Walk with the Saints

The canonisation of Carlo Acutis and Pier Giorgio Frassati is not only about honoring their memory but also about embracing their witness. As a parish, we are invited to ask: how can we become more Eucharistic, more committed to service, and more courageous in sharing our faith?

The saints remind us that holiness is not reserved for a few extraordinary souls - it is a universal call. Carlo and Pier Giorgio now intercede for us, cheering us on from heaven. May we, too, respond with generous hearts, so that one day people may look at our lives and see the same radiance of Christ.

The Road to Sainthood

The Catholic Church follows a careful, prayerful process in declaring someone a saint.

- 1. Servant of God The title given once a bishop opens a cause for canonisation. The person's life and writings are studied for holiness.
- 2. Venerable After thorough investigation, the Pope declares the person lived a life of "heroic virtue." At this stage, no miracle is required.
- **3. Blessed (Beatification)** One miracle through the person's intercession must be verified (except for martyrs). Beatification allows for public veneration, usually in a local diocese or community.
- Saint (Canonisation) A second confirmed miracle is required (again, except for martyrs). Canonisation is a declaration by the Pope that the person is in heaven and worthy of universal veneration.

Through this journey, the Church reminds us that holiness is not only for a few, but for all who faithfully follow Christ.

n a joyful and grace-filled liturgical celebration, ten Consolata Missionaries were ordained to the Diaconate on 8th August 2025 by Rt. Rev. Jackson Murugara, Coadjutor Bishop of Meru. The ceremony, which took place at the Allamano House Chapel in Nairobi, was attended by fellow missionaries, clergy, religious, family members, and members of the faithful.

The ordination came just three days after the deacons had professed their Perpetual Vows on 5th August, marking their full and lifelong consecration to the missionary life of the Consolata Missionary Institute.

Early Life

Deacon Vincent Peter Tibishubwamu, IMC, is a Tanzanian missionary belonging to the Consolata Missionaries (IMC). He was born on 15th June 1991, the third of ten siblings, into a devout Catholic family. He is the son of Mr. Peter Claver Mutashobya and Ms. Savelina Kokulengya. From a young age, Vincent demonstrated discipline, deep faith and a strong sense of dedication - qualities that would later shape and affirm his missionary vocation.

Education

Vincent began his formal education in 2001, completing his primary studies in 2007. He then proceeded to Ordinary Level secondary education (2009 -2012), followed by Advanced Level studies (2013-2015). These formative academic years not only strengthened his intellectual foundations but also nurtured his growing awareness of God's call to serve the Church and society.

Religious Formation

Responding to this divine call, Vincent joined the Consolata Missionaries, beginning his propaedeutic year of formation in Morogoro, Tanzania. From

2017 to 2019, he pursued a Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy at Jordan University College, Morogoro, laying a strong spiritual and intellectual foundation.

y vocation journey began school years, when I became an altar server at Mbitini Parish. I served faithfully for a long time, accompanying the priest during various liturgical celebrations. At that young age, becoming a priest was not something I ever dreamed of. I was simply happy to assist at the altar. I loved the sense of responsibility and reverence that came with the role. Looking back, I can confidently say that my vocation began there - through service and by staying close to the priest and the altar.

After completing primary school, I joined high school. At this stage of my life, I was better able to reflect and make personal decisions. I started thinking about my future and considered various career paths. I thought of becoming a teacher, a medical doctor - and ves, even a priest. But the dream of priesthood still felt distant and unclear.

Despite this, I remained actively involved in the Church and committed to a prayerful life. I continued to ask God for guidance, especially as I reached the crossroads after secondary school. I prayed constantly, seeking clarity on which path to follow. It was during this time that I began to experience the power of prayer in a deeper way - not just as a routine, but as a true source of strength and direction.

Eventually, I made the decision to pursue the priesthood. I wrote to the Vocation Director requesting admission into the Consolata Missionaries. What motivated me most was a deep desire to serve God's people, particularly in areas where I might be most needed.

In August 2015, I began my official formation journey at the propaedeutic stage in Nyeri. This initial phase was a time of orientation and learning more about the Consolata congregation. Like any other vocation, the journey came

y journey toward the Diaconate has been a path of grace, faith, and a growing discovery of God's will. Looking back, I see clearly how the Lord has walked with me through my family and guardians, through the Church, and through the Consolata Missionary Institute shaping me for service in His vineyard.

Early Life and Faith Foundation

Iwas born on 7th October 1993 at Karatina Hospital, Nyeri County, into a simple and faith-filled family. My mother, Lucy Wanjiku Gachuiri, has been a pillar of strength, sacrifice, and love throughout my life. I am blessed with siblings who, despite life's challenges, continue to inspire me. The death of my eldest sister was a deeply painful moment, but it

also awakened in me a greater sense of responsibility, as I came to be regarded as the eldest in the family.



This sacred journey, culminating at the Subukia National Marian Shrine, is one of Kenya's most treasured spiritual traditionsthe Subukia National Pilgrimage.

A Pilgrimage for Healing, Reconciliation and Unity

The pilgrimage day unfolds as thousands of faithful converge from across the country and beyond. They come with varied intentions: families seeking peace, individuals longing for healing, communities praying for unity, and youth aspiring for deeper faith.

Pilgrims participate in:

- The Way of the Cross, ascending the hill through fourteen prayer stations that meditate on Christ's passion.
- Mass and Eucharistic Adoration, where bishops and priests offer the sacrifice of the Mass and invite pilgrims into intimate communion with Jesus.
- **Confession**, which many find a source of spiritual renewal
- Marian Devotions, including the recitation of the Holy Rosary, a central element that invites pilgrims to contemplate the mysteries of Christ through Mary's eves.

Central to the pilgrimage is the shrine's holy spring, discovered in the 1990s and believed to be a source of physical and spiritual healing. Pilgrims drink and bathe in its waters as an act of faith and trust in God's power.

In 2025, this pilgrimage will carry a special significance as it intersects with the universal Catholic Jubilee Year, themed "Pilgrims of Hope." With the Kenya Conference of Catholic Bishops (KCCB) and the Nairobi Metropolitan Archdiocese at the helm, led by Archbishop Philip Anyolo, preparations are underway to welcome the faithful into a season of grace, renewal, and transformation.

The Origins and Growth of Subukia Shrine: A **National Spiritual Treasure**

In 1984, the late Cardinal Maurice Otunga dedicated a vast 200-acre land in Subukia, Nakuru County, as the "Village of Mary, Mother of God." This marked the birth of what would become a national pilgrimage site under the patronage of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Responding to Pope John Paul II's call for national shrines, the Kenya Conference of Catholic Bishops acquired the land with a vision: a place of prayer, penance, and healing that could unite the Church and the nation in faith.

Jubilee Year 2025: A Time for Renewal and Mercy

The 2025 Jubilee Year, declared by Pope Francis and embraced by the KCCB, is a pivotal moment in the life of the Kenyan Church. It is a call to journey together as *pilgrims of hope* renewing faith, deepening mercy, and committing anew to

Archbishop Philip Anyolo, the Archbishop of the Nairobi Metropolitan Archdiocese, has emphasized that the Jubilee Year challenges the faithful to rediscover the power of prayer and the strength of family.

In his pastoral letters, Archbishop Anyolo reminds Catholics that: "The family is the domestic church. If we return to prayer and Scripture as families, we build a foundation that no crisis can shake." He further calls on all parishes and Small Christian Communities (SCCs) to embrace the Jubilee as a time for spiritual renewal, highlighting the centrality of the **Holy Door of Hope** as a symbol of God's mercy and invitation.

The Jubilee Year infuses the Subukia pilgrimage with new energy: a pilgrimage not only of distance but of the heart.

The KCCB's Role: Shepherding a National Spiritual

The Kenya Conference of Catholic Bishops, through its Department of Evangelization and Lay Apostolate, is at the forefront of coordinating the Subukia pilgrimage. In 2025, the KCCB is supporting dioceses and parishes in mobilizing the faithful, especially youth and families, to participate fully.

A special focus is the **restoration and development** campaign for Subukia Shrine, aiming to raise **KES 25 million** to upgrade facilities, protect the environment and enhance the spiritual experience. Justice Alfred Mabeya, chair of the restoration committee, stresses the importance of these efforts: "We are not only renovating buildings; we are

renewing a sacred space that nurtures the faith of millions." Bishop Cleophas Oseso of Nakuru echoes this, highlighting the environmental dimension: "Following Pope Francis' encyclical Laudato Si', we are committed to ecological stewardship. The shrine will become a model of how faith and care for creation go hand in hand."

This vision embraces both the spiritual and physical renewal of the shrine, making it a sanctuary of hope for present and future generations.

The Call to Every Catholic: Be a Pilgrim of Hope



A Night to Remember - Once a Youth: A Celebration of Love in Action













































Celebrating September - The Month of Creation

It is a time when Christians are called to rediscover their vocation as stewards of God's creation, safeguarding the earth as our common home.

This year, the Season of Creation holds a special significance as the Church marks the 10th anniversary of Laudato Si', Pope Francis' groundbreaking encyclical on ecology. His call to respond to both "the cry of the earth and the cry of the *poor*" is especially relevant in Kenya, where environmental degradation and climate change remain pressing challenges for families and communities.

The Consolata Shrine Experience

At Consolata Shrine, Westlands, the Season of Creation has grown beyond a calendar event into a lived expression of faith. Throughout the month, liturgies include creation-themed prayers, hymns, and reflections. Parishioners are reminded in homilies and prayer intentions that safeguarding creation is a core Gospel demand.

This year, the Catholic Justice and Peace Department (CJPD), in collaboration with other parish groups, guided the community in a series of eco-initiatives. These included:

- Tree-planting drives within the Shrine compound and in parishioners' homes, in support of Kenya's national greening campaign.
- Workshops on sustainable living, equipping families with

- practical tools to reduce single-use plastics and manage household waste responsibly.
- **Youth-led drama and spoken word**, creatively bringing to life Pope Francis' Laudato Si' message and inspiring both young and old to embrace ecological conversion.

Such initiatives reflect the words of Pope Francis: "Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue."

A Kenyan Context: Caring for Creation

For Kenyans, the call to creation care is not abstract but rooted in lived reality. Recurring droughts, deforestation, and erratic rainfall continue to threaten livelihoods and biodiversity. In rural parishes, the cry of the poor is deeply connected to the cry of the earth, as families experience crop failures and food insecurity.

Guided by the Kenya Conference of Catholic Bishops (KCCB), the Church has integrated ecological awareness into pastoral life. Alongside advocating for just environmental policies, Catholics are encouraged to take up practical initiatives such

- Planting drought-resistant indigenous trees.
- Harvesting and conserving rainwater.
- Practicing organic farming to protect soil fertility.

Through its pastoral outreach, Consolata Shrine links its urban congregation in Nairobi with these wider national efforts, reminding the faithful that creation care is integral to Christian discipleship.

Families are also taking up the call in small but meaningful ways. From reducing plastic use to choosing eco-friendly household items, these daily practices reflect gratitude for God's gifts. One parishioner put it simply: "Even separating our waste at home is a way of thanking God for His creation."

A Call to Ecological Conversion

The Season of Creation is more than activities: it is a call to conversion. Just as St. Francis of Assisi saw creation as a reflection of God's love, the faithful today are invited to view the earth as a sacred gift entrusted to our care.

In a recent homily at the Shrine, a priest reminded parishioners: "To care for creation is to care for one another. When we protect the forests, rivers, and soil, we protect the future of our children." Such reflections root ecological action firmly within the call to holiness.

As Pope Francis reminds us in Laudato Si': "Let us sing as we go. May our struggles and our concern for this planet never take away the joy of our hope."


Introduction


The survey was facilitated by the **Professional Group**, working in close collaboration with the **Pastoral Team** and the **Parish Executive Committee**.


Parish Survey - Results from Questionnaire




8. a) Are you a parent with children below 18 years?




8. b) Which of the following church groups do your children belong to? 329 responses




What Sacraments have your children received? 329 responses.






8. e) Do you have anyone in your family with special needs?




9. a) How long have you been attending mass at Consolata Shrine or How long have you been coming to Consolata Shrine?




9. b) Which WEEKEND mass do you prefer to attend at Consolata Shrine.?












11. a) Which of the following groups do you belong to at Consolata Shrine? 329 responses




11. b) Which of the following groups would you like to join at Consolata Shrine? 329 responses









12. a) Which of the below attributes do you feel is the strength of Consolata Shrine? 329 responses



12. b) What are the most important issues that Consolata should focus on at the moment? 329 responses




12. c) What areas do you feel need improvement at Consolata Shrine? 329 responses






a) What is your preferred platform to receive communication from Consolata Shrine?




13. b) Given an opportunity to share feedback that would assist church decision making at Consolata Shrine parish, What is your preferred way to give this feedback?


Which of the statements below best describes how you tithe.


