FIRST READING

Exodus 17:8-13

"Whenever Moses held up his hand, Israel prevailed."

A reading from the Book of Exodus

In those days: Amalek came and fought with Israel at Rephidim. And Moses said to Joshua, "Choose for us men, and go out, fight with Amalek; tomorrow I will stand on the top of the hill with the rod of God in my hand." So Joshua did as Moses told him, and fought with Amalek; and Moses, Aaron, and Hur went up to the top of the hill. Whenever Moses held up his hand, Israel prevailed; and whenever he lowered his hand, Amalek prevailed. But Moses' hands grew weary; so they took a stone and put it under him, and he sat upon it, and Aaron and Hur held up his hands, one on one side, and the other on the other side; so his hands were steady until the going down of the sun. And Joshua mowed down Amalek and his people with the edge of the sword.

All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work.

I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom; preach the word, be urgent in season and out of season, convince, rebuke, and exhort, the unfailing in patience and in teaching.

GOSPEL

Luke 18:1-8

God will vindicate his elect, who cry to him day and night.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

At that time: Jesus told his disciples a parable, to the effect that they ought always to pray and not lose heart. He said, "In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor regarded man; and there was a widow in that city who kept coming to him and saying, 'Vindicate me against my adversary.' For a while he refused; but afterwards he said to himself, 'Though I neither fear God nor regard man, yet because this widow bothers me, I will vindicate her, or she will wear me out by her continual coming.'"

And the Lord said, "Hear what the unrighteous judge says. And will not God vindicate his elect, who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long over them? I tell you, he will vindicate them speedily. Nevertheless, when the Son of man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

REFLECTION

THEME : O LORD, TEACH US TO PRAY !

Once I met a lady who said that she had been praying for her daughter-in-law. Now that the Lord heard prayer she was very happy. "Tell me, what happened?" I asked her. She said, "Father, my daughter-in-law is a terrible lady. I asked the Lord to do something and He did! She met with an accident and broke one of her legs!"

Often when I examine my intercessory prayers, I find that they are selfish and all the time aimed at me or at the welfare of my friends, family and community. In this sense I'm not better than a little child who seeks its own comfort and wants everyone to obey its own will. Thus, what St. Augustine says is quite true, "Many are those who look for Jesus are guided solely by worldly interests! Rarely do they seek Jesus for Jesus!"

First Reading (Ex.17:8-13): En route to Canaan from Egypt, the Israelites had to cross many territories occupied by tribal groups. Amalek and his clan were one such group that obstructed Israelites from reaching the Promised Land. Hence, just as Moses earlier raised his arms and parted the Red Sea (Ex.14:16, 21, 26) and struck the rock for water in the wilderness (Ex. 17:5-6); here we find him with raised arms - praying for victory of the Israelites over Amalekites. Miraculously Moses' arms raised result in Amalek's army being razed.

Moses' raised arms must be understood in the context of God's liberative action. The Israelites were slaves who suffered grave injustices. Hence God walked with them towards freedom. He chose along with Moses, Aaron and Hur (who held up Moses' arms on either side till sunset) also Joshua, who mowed down Amalek and his people with the sword.

Second Reading (2 Tim.3:14 - 4:2): In the second reading Paul urges Timothy to live by the Scriptures, "But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed,...and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Jesus Christ" (2 Tim.3:14-15). He also encourages him to preach the Word in season and out of season, "All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work" (2 Tim.3:16-17).

Gospel Reading (Lk.18:1-8): In the gospel reading through the parable of the widow and the unjust judge, Jesus teaches the necessity of perseverance in prayer. The unjust judge grants justice to the widow solely because of her persistence. He said, "Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming" (Lk.18:4-5). Being a widow, the woman is specially loved by God who takes providential care of the anawim (orphans, widows, aliens). Jesus' final question to his hearers drives home the message, "And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?" (Lk.18:8).

Today, do you raise your arms towards God to beg favours for yourself, for others, to praise God or to surrender to God's will? True prayer requires humility, courage and total trust in the Lord. Indeed, more than Moses with arms raised, we have a Master with arms raised not only in prayer during his lifetime, but also in surrender on the Cross to the Will of the Father, when He died for you and me. Let's then surrender our lives to him!

Prayer of Open Hands: Lord God give me whatever you want to give; and take away from me whatever you want to take. Grant me your grace to accept your will and follow you. Amen.
